The Boston Marathon is one of the most famous races in the world. It's also the world's oldest annual marathon. With such a long distance (42.2 kilometers) and such a long history (beginning in 1897), the Marathon has given birth to several inspiring stories.

One famous Boston Marathon story is that of Dick and Rick Hoyt. When Rick was born, he could not use his arms or legs, and he would never learn to speak normally. But one day his father Dick discovered that Rick loved to race while he pushed him in a wheelchair. So they started racing together. In total they completed 32 Boston Marathons this way. To honor the father and son, the Marathon installed a statue of them near the starting line.

Another famous story is that of Bobbi Gibb. As a young woman in 1966, she wanted to run in the Marathon. But back then women were not allowed to participate. Many people thought that women did not have the ability to run long distances. But Bobbi knew that was wrong. And she also really wanted to run! So she put on men's clothes, sneaked into the race, and finished the entire marathon – three years in a row! Decades later, the Marathon officially recognized her as the Marathon's first official woman's champion for each of those years.
