II. Reading Comprehension 閱讀理解 — 8%

Tense moments of waiting are common in baseball, but that may be a thing of the past. After several years of testing in the minor leagues and during spring training, Major League Baseball (MLB) plans to use the Automated Ball-Strike System, or ABS, during the 2026 season.

ABS, nicknamed the "robot umpire," reduces human error. Its cameras and tracking equipment determine whether a pitch is a ball or a strike. The home-plate umpire will still make the original call for each pitch. However, if a player challenges the umpire's decision, ABS comes into play. There used to be tension-filled moments as video was played back for closer looks at what happened during a play. Now, thanks to the ABS's careful tracking, it can quickly settle the issue.

Each team starts a game with two challenges. By tapping their head, those who hit, pitch or catch the ball can show they want to challenge an umpire's call. During testing of the ABS system at MLB's spring training, an average of 50 percent of the challenges succeeded. The ABS system is making baseball fairer.

Some people look forward to less arguing in the middle of the game. It will speed the game up and keep it moving. Yet others worry it will take some of the fun and excitement out of the game. But maybe not yet.

Although known as the "robot umpire," it does not look like a robot. Instead, ABS has twelve high-speed cameras to track each pitch and judge whether it crosses the strike zone. But there is still the possibility of mistakes. For example, the ABS has to adjust to the batting player's height, and it is still possible for the ABS to adjust incorrectly. It's not yet a perfect system, but baseball is becoming fairer and games shorter with this new umpire in town.

Because of Jane Goodall's time spent with chimpanzees in Africa, she changed the way the world thinks about them.

As a child, Goodall was brave, curious and full of dreams about one day living in Africa. Her dream would come true, leading to an amazing discovery.

The little girl imagined living among Africa's wild animals but never thought it would ever happen. Not only did it become a reality, but, while there, Goodall set a new scientific standard for animal behavior research.

Though she had her mother's encouragement to travel to Africa, there were many challenges ahead. She had no scientific training, no degree, and she was female. When she turned 18, she began doing various jobs. She worked as a waitress, a secretary and assistant editor, all to save money, in case she ever had the opportunity to travel to Africa. In 1957, she accepted a friend's invitation to visit Africa, and Goodall's life changed forever! After she arrived, she met the famous archaeologist Dr. Louis Leakey. Before long, she was

working for him at the natural history museum in Nairobi, Kenya. He quickly realized that Goodall had a large amount of patience, a necessary quality for all field researchers. One day, Dr. Leakey asked Goodall if she would consider living among the chimpanzees in East Africa and observing their daily lives. The young woman eagerly agreed, and in July 1960, she arrived in Tanzania at the Gombe Stream Game Reserve, excited for her adventure to begin. While she was there, she made a discovery that changed the way chimp behavior was viewed by the scientific community.

During Goodall's first few months in the forest, it was difficult for her to observe the chimps because they would run from her. But before long, they became used to her being there and began to ignore her while they went about their daily routines.

One day, while she was watching an older chimp, she noticed that he kept sticking a blade of grass into a termite hill. Then he would take it out, over and over again, to eat the termites on the grass. This was a meaningful discovery because, up until then, scientists thought only humans made and used tools.

Over time, the chimpanzees accepted Goodall into their society. As she carefully interacted with them through the years, she discovered them to be smart, emotional animals living in complex social communities.

In the 1980s, Goodall became aware of a global decrease in animal habitats, including the Gombe area. This discovery led her to become a full-time champion for animals in the wild. She began traveling over 300 days each year, speaking to international groups and encouraging them to get involved in protecting animals and their habitats. Because of Goodall's actions to protect wildlife, her impact was felt around the world.

In 1991, Goodall established Roots and Shoots, a youth conservation program with hands-on programs that bring positive changes for animals, the environment and local communities. Today, there are programs in 60 countries.

Celebrated scientist and conservationist Jane Goodall passed away on October 1, 2025. But today her life continues to inspire millions of people around the world to protect the planet and its amazing wonders.
